YSC SUMMIT I HOUSTON, TX

IN MARCH 2015, nearly 600 survivors, co-survivors and healthcare providers from across the country gathered in Houston, Texas for the inaugural national YSC Summit. For three days, we addressed the unique needs of the women we serve through 30 educational and wellness workshops; inspirational talks from renowned speakers like Dr. Susan Love; discussion groups led by some of the nation's top social workers; and opportunities for attendees to make lasting connections with others who know what it's like to face breast cancer at a young age.

YSC REGIONAL SYMPOSIUM WASHINGTON, DC


OUR FIRST-EVER NORTHEAST REGIONAL SYMPOSIUM in June 2015 brought together approximately 200 young survivors and their co-survivors to focus on quality-of-life issues and how to thrive after a breast cancer diagnosis. Experts led workshops to share solutions for everyday problems; tools for self-care and improving relationships; and opportunities to forge meaningful connections with other attendees. 

INNOVATION

WE KNOW YOUNG WOMEN DIAGNOSED WITH

BREAST CANCER HAVE A STRONG DESIRE TO CONNECT IN PERSON WITH OTHER YOUNG SURVIVORS, but that's not always possible. This year, we launched our online video support group program so young women can get the support they need in the comfort of their own homes. The three groups—one for women ages 30 and under, another for young women with metastatic breast cancer and a third for young women newly diagnosed or in treatment—are led by a trained facilitator and provide a safe place to share feelings, experiences, information and resources.

EMPOWERMENT

VOLUNTEERS ARE THE HEART AND SOUL OF YSC, activating our mission online and in their local communities. In 2015, we saw a 50% increase in one-on-one peer support through our SurvivorLink program. Our Face 2 Face (F2F) program grew by 80% in 2015—helping 3,726 young breast cancer survivors connect in person with other survivors. And, our State Leader program grew by 55%, with more than 100 volunteers leading the charge to ensure young women and healthcare providers across the country have access to YSC services.




